Our dataset contains over 100,000 observations of grant making between US foundations and Mexican foundations, respectively, to Mexican nonprofits spanning the years of 2008 to 2013. This dataset included conversion of grant amounts from Mexican Peso to U.S. 2013 constant dollars. Additionally, I translated information for our dataset construction and gathered data from Mexican websites. This dataset will help address questions of migration patterns and borderland policy changes.

After filing the Institutional Review Board applications for our project, I administered two of the three surveys from initial survey packet mail out to final reminder calls done by two Bush School Masters students. After the first two surveys of Texas United Way Foundations and nonprofits, I produced a policy memo of the results for the United Way of Texas and nonprofits participants. Currently, we are finalizing a complete nested dataset with our data and respective city level demographic and government spending information.
